You MUST provide content warnings at the TOP of your workshop writings, in-class assignments, and presentation if they contain the following or mentions of the following: abuse, sexual assault/coercion/violence. More may be added to the list depending on the classes' needs. **Failure to provide content warnings when needed will result in an automatic F for the assignment, no exceptions.**

Details of Assignments:

Workshop Writings

One week before your workshop, print copies of your poem/story for the whole class (including me) and hand them out during class time. Late poems and stories will NOT be accepted for workshop.

- Always include your name on your submissions. Stick to standard Serif fonts like Times New Roman, Garamond, Baskerville Old Face, etc.
- All prose submissions (not including critique paragraphs) must be typed and double-spaced in black 12pt font with 1-inch margins. Number your pages so we can reference them during workshops.
- All poetry submissions must be single-spaced in 12pt font and on the left margin—unless you have a good reason to do otherwise. No centered poems.
- Remember content warnings!

Workshop Critiques

Read each poem/story submitted for workshop carefully, critique it by writing on the submission, and bring it to class ready to discuss. I am also requiring that you write a paragraph of about 100 words per poem and 400 words per short story to give to each person being workshopped. These will count as your points for workshop days. Give your critiques to the people being workshopped at the end of the workshop session.

Assigned Readings

In addition to reading your peers' poems and stories, we will read a selection of poetry and fiction from a diverse array of writers. We will read the four assigned books as well as some standalone poems, stories, and craft essays. Take detailed notes and come to class ready to discuss. If it appears that students are not doing the readings, there will be reading quizzes. Content warnings are listed in the "List of Works" document. If you need a content warning for something I have not mentioned in the "Content Warning" section of the syllabus, please let me know and I will include them.

In-Class Assignments

We will have weekly in-class writing exercises to sharpen your craft skills. Turn in these assignments via email at the end of class. You will have a one-hour grace period from the end of class.

Presentations

You will prepare and present an approximately 20-minute presentation on a section of one of our required readings. You must include a visual aid such as Powerpoint, Prezi, etc. This presentation will be centered on the craft of the book and include line notes for a section of the book such as two poems, the first few paragraphs of a chapter, etc.

Final Portfolio

At the end of the course, each student will be expected to turn in a final portfolio which will include:

- 1) One revised story and three revised poems, complete with original drafts
- 2) A written response to a piece of fiction and a piece of poetry we didn't study in class
- 3) A 1-2-page final analysis of the student's own personal writing development during the course of the semester

This portfolio will be graded primarily on your own individual progress in this course, measured predominately through the boldness and improvement of your revisions. The portfolio is due the last day of class.

On Wellbeing

I respect the fullness of your lives and responsibilities outside of this class. If you experience something that impedes your ability to learn in this class, I invite you to discuss this with me. You absolutely do not have to disclose the details of your circumstances, but you are welcome to approach me so we might locate resources or other guidance for you.

Attendance

“Student absences resulting from illness, family crisis, University-sponsored activities involving scholarship or leadership/participation responsibilities, jury duty or subpoena for court appearance, military duty, and religious observances are excusable according to university rules. Excused absences will not be penalized, but the student is expected to make up any work missed in a timely manner. **If you are sick or think you are getting sick, do not come to class.** Students do not need to provide documentation for illness, family crisis, or religious observances.

However, if a student is suspected to be abusing this policy, the instructor reserves the right to ask for documentation for all subsequent absences. If you know in advance that you will miss a class, then please let me know so that we can make arrangements.

Late Work

Though workshop assignments and writing exercises will not receive letter grades, they must be turned in on time to receive full credit. Any work turned in after the day it was due will only receive half credit unless there are extenuating circumstances such as illness or a family emergency.

Inclement Weather

When the university is closed, all classes are also cancelled. If a weather delay affects university operations, then class will be cancelled if it is scheduled before the university resumes operations.

Emergency Procedures

In the event of an armed assailant or physical attack (CADD):

- CALL—9-1-1
- AVOID—If possible, self-evacuate to a safe area outside of the building.
- DENY—Barricade doors with desks, chairs, bookcases, or similar objects. Move to a place inside the room where you are not visible. Turn off the lights and remain quiet until police arrive.
- DEFEND- Use chairs, desks, cell phones or whatever is immediately available to distract
